Officer J.K. Shubert to Receive Medal of Valor



On Jan. 19, 2013 a resident called the Manassas City Police Department to report a suspicious person who was standing on the sidewalk on Liberia Ave. at the overpass. She was looking down at the

railroad tracks and it looked as if she wanted to jump. Two officers were

dispatched to the scene. Officer Shubert, who was nearby, also answered the call and was first to respond.

On this area of the bridge on Liberia Ave. there is a fence about 40 feet long which serves as an added security measure for pedestrian traffic crossing the intersection. The person in question was on the opposite side, or the unsafe side, of the fence when Officer Shubert approached.

Officer Shubert requested that the person come back to the safety of the overpass. She responded that she would not. Without hesitation, Officer Shubert

moved along the fence to rescue the woman. This put him at personal risk should the person have decided to jump or struggle. Officer Shubert was able to successfully grab the female and walk her back to safety. It was later determined that her intention was to end her life. Had Officer Shubert not acted so quickly, precious time would have been wasted and the outcome may have ended in tragedy.

For his heroic efforts, Officer J.K. Shubert will be recognized with a City of Manassas Medal of Valor Award at the City Council meeting on May 13, 2013.

New Exhibit at the Manassas Museum - Enduring Legacy: Liberia Plantation

Liberia Plantation is a Manassas historic gem that served as a Civil War headquarters and was visited by two Presidents. It is the focus of a new exhibit, *Enduring Legacy, Liberia Plantation 1825-2013*, opening May 10 at The Manassas Museum.

Liberia Plantation has been named to the National Historic Register, the Virginia Landmarks Register, and is being recognized during Virginia's Year of the Historic Home, but its captivating story has never been the subject of an exhibit until now.

Built in 1825, Liberia was one of the most prosperous and largest plantations in the region. During the Civil War, Liberia served as headquarters for both Confederate and Union forces and was visited by Jefferson Davis and Abraham Lincoln. After the devastation of the war, Liberia was transformed into a successful dairy farm and became home to the Breeden family, who later donated the property to The City of Manassas.

Enduring Legacy details the establishment of the plantation by the Weir family and their ties to the wealthy and influential Carter family of Virginia. The exhibit explores the conflicting attitudes about slavery within the family, despite owning nearly 90 slaves, and what happened to the family and their slaves when the home was occupied by Civil War troops. Period furnishings, Civil War artifacts, and ledgers from Liberia's time as a dairy farm are also included.

The exhibit features a hands-on experience for children and adults, including an activity with a cipher disk - a Civil War spy tool. The exhibit also describes architectural features, construction of the home, and more about the home's original owners.

The Manassas Museum has restored parts of the exterior of the house, with



the help of generous Museum supporters, and hosts tours and special events on site. Recently, a Citizens Advisory Committee recommended a master plan for the site. This will provide direction for future restoration.

Enduring Legacy is free with admission, and is open Tuesday - Sunday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. A companion book that benefits Liberia restoration, *Liberia, Sentry of the Ages*, and various commemorative gifts are available at *Echoes*, the Museum Store.

City Trains 5 EMS Bike Team Members

The City of Manassas Fire and Rescue Department has trained five technicians as members of the EMS Bike Team. This is a 40-hour course on safe bicycle operations and biking skills during high and low speed maneuvers and navigating challenging courses.

“Having an EMS Bike Team is a great asset to the City of Manassas,” said City Manager John A. Budesky. “With all of the parades and events that happen in the City, these medics can get through a crowd and to an injured person much more easily.”

Previously, the City had six qualified bike medics, two of which are certified bike instructors. Joining the bike medics are Fire Medic Kristopher Otten, Fire Medic Justin Reed, Fire Medic Brian Seay, Firefighter EMT Matt Eichhorst and Firefighter EMT Jamieson Jewett.

These highly trained medics, trained by instructors Lt. Jason Bowers and Master Technician Steve Schmid, can navigate through crowds and use small spaces, such as alleys and paths, to reach

patients who otherwise may have to wait precious minutes for an ambulance to arrive.

“With serious medical conditions, time is of the essence,” said Fire and Rescue Chief Brett Bowman. “The time saved by bike navigation through the crowded events and festivals within the City can literally mean the difference between life and death.”

Bike medics in the City of Manassas carry a full line of medical equipment, including a full line of basic life support equipment, an automatic external defibrillator (AED) and Oxygen.

City Named Tree City USA

The City of Manassas has been named a 2012 Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of the City's commitment to effective urban forest management. This is the 23rd year the City of Manassas has earned this national designation.

The City of Manassas achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the program's four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree-care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita and an Arbor Day observance and proclamation.

"The City is honored to be a Tree City USA," said City Manager John A. Budesky. "In becoming a Tree City, the City of Manassas benefits with cleaner air, improved storm water management and energy savings, which helps to increase our property values and commercial activity."
