Five new firefighters were sworn into office by Mayor Harry J. Parrish II. These new firefighters join a team of more than 60 sworn personnel protecting City of Manassas residents.

Firefighter/EMT Stephen Boensel attended George Mason University and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Administration of Justice. During his college years, Stephen volunteered with the Fairfax Volunteer Fire Department in the City of Fairfax. After college he became a volunteer with the Manassas Volunteer Fire Company and is excited for this next step in fire services with the City of Manassas Fire and Rescue Department.

Firefighter/EMT Dustin Clay followed in his father's footsteps by joining the fire service early in life. He volunteered at the Rockville Volunteer Fire Department during college at Montgomery College in Maryland. He has served in the Waynesboro Fire Department and the Fredericksburg Fire Department before coming to Manassas.



He is currently also a volunteer with the Stanardsville Volunteer Fire Department.

Firefighter/Medic J. Alexander Hall has been in the fire service for more than five years with the Dale City Volunteer Fire Department. Shortly after becoming a volunteer, J realized the fire service was a way of life and his way of giving back to the community. He says the City of Manassas Fire and Rescue Department was a great choice because it feels like more of a family environment.

Firefighter/Medic Benjamin Page graduated from Shenandoah University with two Bachelor of Science degrees in 2009. While working as a personal trainer he became a volunteer medic. A Message from the City Manager

Last month I wrote about a "sense of place" in Manassas, one of the themes coming out of your community input. This month I want to talk about a second theme which emerged from this research, a "sense of opportunity."

So why do people think the City of Manassas is an opportunistic place? From a historical perspective, Manassas exists because of the opportunities created by the convergence of strategic railroad lines at "Manassas Junction" leading to Washington, Richmond and the Shenandoah Valley. In the 1930's the Manassas Town Council proposed the building of a landing strip which was relocated in the 1960's and now is

the busiest general aviation airport in Virginia serving around 30 businesses including Aurora Flight Sciences and contributing more than \$234 million to the local economy.

Also in the 60's IBM created a 600-acre facility in the City of Manassas which is still a major employment center today with Lockheed Martin, Micron and BAE all having a significant presence on the site. Each of these companies was recently named by Forbes Magazine as one of the top places to work in the US. The 60's also saw the community come together to build Lake Manassas and to establish a hospital in Manassas that has continued to grow and is now a part of the Novant Health medical system and remains one of the top employers in the region.

Terms such as business-friendly, strategic location, access to markets, a talent pipeline, an environment for growth and idea exchange, inclusive, supportive, a spirit of innovation and entrepreneurism were all used to describe the sense of opportunity in the City of Manassas today.

As a part of our strategic planning focus to maintain this sense of opportunity, the City plans to support

the growth of individuals and businesses by providing opportunities for residents to live, work, learn and thrive in a City that values independence and access. This translates into goals of having a comprehensive economic development program, supporting Manassas City Public Schools as well as other educational possibilities, marketing and developing underutilized parts of our City, and creating new opportunities for the next generation.

If you did not know, Manassas is home to over 1,400 businesses employing over 20,000 individuals that show cases the diversity of our community in business ownership as well as the large impact that veterans are having in our community. May was business appreciation month, which gave the City several opportunities to thank many of the businesses that are creating jobs and wealth in our community and I would like to take this opportunity to again thank all of our local businesses for your role in supporting our community.

A Few Notes from Public Works

Get Ready for Mosquito Season



Recently in Virginia, an increasing number of animals and humans have tested positive for the mosquito-borne

West Nile virus.

All mosquitoes need water in which to pass their early life stages. Water standing just a few days can produce a crop of mosquitoes!

You can limit the mosquitos around your home by eliminating all sources of standing water around your property that can support mosquito breeding such as:

- Old bottles and tin cans
- Vases, flower pots, and bird feeders
- Old tires
- Clogged roof gutters
- Ornamental ponds
- Plastic wading pools

Plan ahead and stay safe during mosquito season:

- Avoid activity outside when mosquitoes are most active, especially at dawn and dusk.
- Wear long pants, long sleeve shirts and other protective clothing and apply insect repellent according to label instructions before engaging in outdoor activities.
- Keep infants indoors during peak mosquito hours. If outside, cover cribs, bassinets or playpens with suspended mosquito netting.

What can the City do?

The City of Manassas is working to plan, design and maintain stormwater drains and ditches to eliminate or to minimize the proliferation of disease-carrying mosquitoes.

Heavy Yard Waste Collections Ahead

As more and more residents return to their gardens, yard waste collections are becoming heavier. Crews begin Monday yard waste collections at 6 a.m. and often work through to 8:30 p.m. gathering the yard waste that is then recycled as landscaping material. Crews are often slowed down picking up loose yard waste material and sorting through heavy bags as they check for non-yard waste materials.

Here are a few tips that can help move the collections along and ensure that you are setting everything out correctly:

- Set your yard waste out on Sunday night
- Use brown paper yard waste bags -NO plastic bags, please
- Keep bags light NO dirt or sod, please
- Bundle and tie branches and brush
- Set your yard waste in a spot where it can be seen

What's Going on at Portner Ave. and West Street?

Portner Avenue near West Street is part of the Upper Flat Branch Interceptor Project. The Public Works Department broke ground on this project in March of 2015. Currently the contractor, General Excavation Inc. and the City of Manassas are working near the project's downstream limits, installing new sanitary sewer lines and a large storm box culvert between Portner Ave. and West St. This long anticipated project will improve storm drainage in an area of Historic Downtown Manassas that has experienced severe flooding.

City residents can expect to see Columbia Gas Company in the vicinity over the next few months to upgrade gas services. The City's contractor will continue to improve the sanitary and storm sewer infrastructure up to Main Street as the project progresses. The current schedule for project completion is February 2016.
